

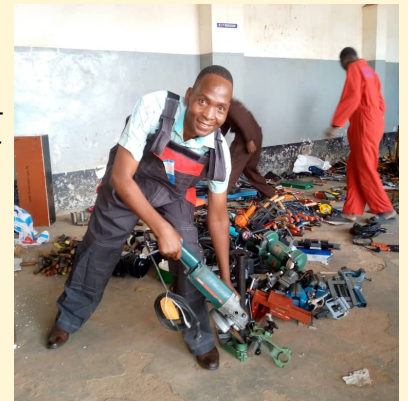


Exciting years for CCP

'Due to the enormous impact that Corona has had on our society, poverty has increased enormously throughout the country.' This cry for help was voiced by both CCP director Nathan Walyaula (pictured) and the Ugandan chairman. The media also writes about the step backwards that the economy has made in many African countries. As quickly as Europe seems to be recovering from the blow, it is so difficult in Africa. Due to the drop in income, there are insufficient resources in the families to pay school fees. As a result, many schools are in danger of 'falling over'. CCP's vocational training courses are also affected by this. Together with our partners, we are looking for solutions to perhaps continue in a slimmed-down form. Meanwhile, social work and the farm are running at full speed. More on that in this letter. We are grateful for the loyal supporters of our foundation, which allows the work for the most vulnerable to continue and even expand!

Saved Tools

We are happy to mention that the container with tools has arrived in Uganda. Last week, CCP picked up their share at the customs depot in Jinja. It are tools which will be used during the lessons at the technical school. There are also a number of starter kits for graduate students who are unable to purchase tools themselves. In contrast to Europe, Ugandan employees have to provide their own tools to work for the boss. It are used tools that were collected and overhauled in the Netherlands by Stichting Gered Gereedschap and is now getting a second life in Uganda. We are very grateful to the Gered Gereedschap Foundation for its cooperation.



Goat farm

The herd of goats on the farm has grown to about 300 animals this year. That is very good, because this year, for the first time, CCP can supply goats itself to the 'goat program for widows'. This is a program in which poor widows are given a chance to earn an income in groups by keeping and breeding goats. Our goal is to hand over 50 pregnant goats to the new owners this year.

CCP farming

In addition to goat breeding on the farm, the agricultural land is used for growing crops. In March, 8 hectares of maize, 4 hectares of soya and 8 hectares of sorghum were sown. The corn and soy are used for meals at the CCP schools and hostel. The sorghum is grown for a new customer, which are the bakeries of 'Bake for Life'. In these bakeries, Ugandans with a disability follow a full-fledged bakery training. In order to be less dependent on the grain from Ukraine, Bake for Life started looking for opportunities to use local raw materials. Sorghum is a well-known cereal in Uganda that thrives better than European cereals. Bake for Life has asked CCP to grow sorghum for them. The agricultural land that we have now sown with sorghum seed is the beginning of a hopefully long-term cooperation and an opportunity to make Uganda less dependent on imported grain. Magical limit reached

After a CCP presentation in the Driehoekkerk in Bleiswijk, we reached the magical limit of 300 sponsored children. The 300th sponsor received a surprise from Uganda. We have long strived for this because social work can work most cost-effectively with 300 children. But the number of children still waiting for help is also magical. The children of CCP come from families with major problems, such as: both parents murdered, parents who commit suicide in hopeless situations such as AIDS and other health problems. Some mothers are in jail or are dealing with alcohol and similar problems. If you become a sponsor, you save a child. Fortunately, there are many sponsors who support even more than one child. Vincent

Vincent was born in 2018 as the fourth in a family with 4 boys. Joseph's mother died of domestic violence in early 2023. Vincent's father is in prison. Grandma is currently taking care of Vincent but she has no source of income and is very poor. In addition to Vincent, she also has other children under her care. Vincent attends the Namanyonyi school in kindergarten.

Dorien

Dorien was born in 2019 as the third in a family with one boy and two girls. Dorien's father died of a heart attack in 2020. The mother takes care of her children but is very poor. She works in people's gardens and also occasionally tries to sell some vegetables herself. But that is not enough to support the family. The family lives in Kachuru-Butebo.
